
## Flatten the curve



From the beginning of the outbreak, scientists and doctors have been arguing for social distancing as a way to "flatten the curve" i.e. make sure that the healthcare system in each country is not overrun by patients, that hospitals and GPs rather receive patients over a longer time span, allowing them to treat the ill. Most countries have now adopted these measures.

What we want to look at today is the word "**flatten**", which means to make flat. Many verbs in English are made by simply adding an —en to the adjective or noun to make a verb.

(Here flat + en = to flatten). If you know this, you can quickly extend your vocabulary. This is especially useful for SIZE and COLOUR words:
